A WEE WORD FROM DR. WEENINK

Shabat — Sabbath

The story is told of a wagon train on its way from St. Louis to Oregon. Its members were devout Christians, so the whole group observed the habit of stopping for the Sabbath day. Winter was approaching quickly, however, and some among the group began to panic in fear that they wouldn't reach their destination before the heavy snows. Consequently, several members proposed that they discontinue their practice of stopping for the Sabbath and continue driving onward seven days a week.

The proposal triggered a lot of contention in the community. So finally it was suggested that the wagon train should split into two groups—those who wanted to observe the Sabbath and those who preferred to travel on that day. Both groups set out and traveled together until the next Sabbath day, when one group continued while the other remained at rest.

Who do you think got to Oregon first? It was those who kept the Sabbath. They are the ones who reached their destination first. Both the people and the horses were rested, restored and renewed by their Sabbath observance that they traveled much more vigorously and effectively the other six days of the week.¹

There is a Greek proverb that states "the bow that is always bent will soon cease to shoot straight." In the book of Genesis we see how God placed in Creation this same essential rhythm. Six days, God worked; on the seventh, God rested. Jesus, we read in the Gospels, was an individual of intense activity. He preached, taught, listened, and healed. He worked; then, we are told, He withdrew. Jesus did more than withdraw. He prayed. He set His compass, wound His watch, set the time with a focus on God. He rejuvenated and renewed.

Marva Dawn says, "When we cease from all our labors to control or to understand, there is time in our space for the eternal." Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel wrote, "On the Sabbath we specifically care for the need of eternity planted in our own soul." And Theologian John Calvin, the founder of what we know as the Protestant Work Ethic said: "On the Sabbath we cease our work so God can ... work in us. (Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), Invitation to Sabbath)

Lots of prayer has gone into learning about the benefits of clergy renewal leave/sabbatical and actually taking the leap to try it. Continued prayer is needed in order that it will not only be done well, but that we will also find it as an occasion for mutual growth. It requires creativity and willingness on the part of clergy to respond in spirit and take responsibility for personal and ministerial growth. It takes the same willingness on the part of the congregation. The Session has endeavored diligently to engender that willingness in approving a clergy renewal leave—a sabbatical for Rev. Dr. Carrie N. Mitchell that will commence at the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday, March 6, and will conclude at the first of June. This is all possible because Carrie was awarded a grant through the Lilly Foundation specifically intended for Clergy Renewal.

The purpose of a clergy renewal leave is to "replenish the well' emotionally, physically, intellectually, and spiritually. Your leadership has learned from a host of congregations and clergy who have undertaken a renewal leave (or sabbatical) and the Lilly Foundation how that should and should not happen. It should not happen, on one hand, in the form of a vacation, or, on the other hand, an academic course of study, but

rather through intentional experiences that will "make one's heart sing." I commend to your reading the Handbook for Clergy Renewal Leave (sabbatical leave) which will be made available to you in the church office. It will contain the design for the leave; ways in which Carrie and her family will be able to find the spaces and places "to make their hearts' sing"; some frequently asked questions; contact persons and a host of other useful information.

While this is something new for us, and may raise some anxiety, it promises immense propensity for growth. If you are experiencing a tinge of anxiety about this, please know that this is not unusual. In many regards this is a leap of faith that is accompanied by elements of fear and uncertainty that come "before the plunge." Our intent, as a congregation and staff, is to concentrate on the immense potential for growth and understand that God is in this plan. We are all confident that there will be no disruption of pastoral services during this renewal time.

Poet Wendell Berry, a deeply spiritual individual, takes a walk every Sunday morning and then goes home and composes a Sabbath poem. Here is one he wrote in 1979:

Whatever is foreseen in joy
Must be lived out from day to day.
Vision held open in the dark
By our ten thousand days of work.
Harvest will fill the barn; for that
The hand must ache, the face must sweat.

And yet no leaf or grain is filled By work of ours; the field is tilled And left to grace. That we may reap, Great work is done while we're asleep. When we work well, a Sabbath mood Rests on our day, and finds it good.

Nope, we've "never done anything like this before." Continue in prayer that, with God's help, we will figure out how to do it well and grow together in witness, faith and service.

On December 26, a group of volunteers headed to Myrtle Beach, SC: Dan Harrison, Janette Henderson, Craig and Calypso Kunkle, and Dan Traina from Pittsford, NY; Nick Tangney from Hartford, CT; Bev and Adam Pollock from Venice, FL; and Leah Preston from Charlotte, NC. There we met up with two old friends, Joanne and David Churchill, who now live in nearby Conway.

We stayed at the Timberlake Baptist Church and largely worked on a house owned by Sam and Cleah in the Rosewood section of Socastee. Their house is across the road from the Intercoastal Waterway and backs onto a retention pond—they were doomed when Hurricane Florence caused flooding in the area in September—their house was five feet underwater and they lost almost everything.

Everything was well planned—materials were on site, Adam got us organized, and pairs of experienced team members worked their tails off for 7 days—in fact they dry-walled the whole 2,000 sq ft house in five days! Bev did an amazing job of cleaning up the trimmings and

One of the most rewarding things was the fact that the owners helped with the work. Sam had been an electrician, and he and his brother worked on restoring the electric lines and plumbing. Interactions and conversations with the owners were so satisfying for the volunteers, and Sam was so kind and grateful for our help—he actually took all the volunteers and several family members out for lunch at his friend's diner one day—delicious southern cooking.

We took a day off on Sunday, attended worship at the Baptist church and headed to Conway for a BBQ of smoked brisket at the Churchill's—and then it was back to work on Monday. I don't think a single person on the team was awake for New Year's Eve, having worked 8am-6pm every day. Most of us returned home around January 2—tired, but grateful for the opportunity to enjoy each other and know we had helped one family in distress.

Tres M Ministerios

Three from FPC will join a team of fifteen to serve in Tabi, Q. Roo, Mexico. Ginny Vorhis, Carole Bell and Dr. Weenink will be part of the delegation Tres M Ministerios.

The Village of Tabi (Tah-Bee) is in the central portion of the Province of Quintana Roo on the Yucatan Peninsula. It is west of the town Felipe Carillo Puerto. Further to its West is the province, or state – Yucatan. If one goes due East one would enter into the Sian Ka'an international biosphere, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. ttps://whc.unesco.org/en/list/410



The population is under 400 and reflects the life of a typical lowland Mayan village. The name Tabi is said to mean "trap," likely referring to the thatch-covered holes invaders fell into as they chased escaping Maya into the bush. The Spanish captured and enslaved the Maya. This region was home to the Maya insurrection against the Spanish.

A facility intended to serve as a health clinic was started in 2001 and never finished. The team will work with the villagers to transform it into a multi-use community center. Three churches are uniting to help spearhead the effort and mobilize the community. We will help them finish the facility. We will clean the deteriorating concrete structure; remove vegetation; pour a 'concreto' (2' layer of concrete on the roof); do some plumbing and electrical work under the guidance of hired workers, and connect with new friends with whom we will worship, work and play – side by side.

Ginny, Carole and Jeffrey will be on this journey from January 24 - February 2. Please pray for them and the others who will be serving on this mission and seek them out upon their return to hear more about how God is at work in this region.

If you want to contribute to the effort the following items are useful to residents of Tabi. Any donations will be distributed among them. For youth: soccer equipment – balls, air pumps etc. Baseball gloves will be of lasting interest. For men: baseball caps, leatherman tools. For women: hair ties, barrettes, sewing kits/supplies, Tupper-type storage containers. For everyone: small LED flashlights, toothbrushes, combs, brushes, personal care items, umbrellas (esp. collapsible come in handy both when the sun shines and when it rains).
