CHARTING THE COURSE WITH PASTOR AARON

My two-year old son is in the habit of frequently asking, "Why?" "Be careful to hold your cup with two hands." "Why, Dada?" "You need to hold my hand when we go down these stairs." "Why, Dada?" "One cookie is enough for you to eat." "Why, Dada?" I try to always respond to him with something more than, "Because I said so." I try to give him an honest reason why I'm telling him to do something. Most of the time, an honest explanation is all he wants.

Answering the "Why?" question can sometimes be annoying or frustrating. It takes less time and mental energy if we don't have to explain ourselves. It would be so much easier if kids would just "get it" and do what we want. But that's rarely how it works. Nevertheless—and this may surprise you—I wish more people would act like kids and frequently ask, "Why?"

In his book *Start with Why: How Great Leaders Inspire Everyone to Take Action*, Simon Sinek explains a concept he calls the Golden Circle. The Golden Circle is a learning tool to illustrate the reason some leaders are so successful at compelling actions. It uses a series of three concentric circles. The outer most circle is "WHAT," describing the things we do. The middle circle is "HOW," describing the way we do the things we do. The innermost circle is "WHY," explaining the reason for the other two circles. Most people understand the WHAT and HOW but seldom the WHY. Just consider our church. WHAT do we do? We worship, we eat, we socialize, we learn, and we serve. HOW do we do it? We have committees and boards and meetings. But do we know the reasons for WHAT we do and HOW we do it? Some of us might, but what about people outside the church? Do they know the WHY? Would we expect them to care about WHAT we do and HOW we do it if they don't know the WHY?

Sinek says that WHY is connected to the part of our brains that controls decision-making. If we don't know the WHY for our church, we're probably going to care very little about it, let alone be able to help other people care about it, too. As we continue our journey through Lent, I encourage you to ask WHY frequently and with honesty. Why do we do what we do? Why should we be doing them now? In one way or another, our answer to those questions should lead us to Easter, which is the single greatest WHY for everything we do and believe as Christians.

Yoga for Wellness


Drop-in yoga continues in the chapel on both Tuesdays and Thursdays, 10–11 am. Please join us with your mat and \$10. Get your body back for spring!

Trustees at Work – Buildings and Grounds

You may not be aware, but our church has a large and complex heating system, with multiple zones and computerized controls. To save energy, areas of the building are kept at low temperatures when not in use. Recently, we had several comments that the sanctuary was uncomfortably cold during Sunday services. The sanctuary is to be 71° from about 6 am until noon on Sunday. I checked, and found that though the setting was 71°, the actual temperature was 67°. Something was not working properly.

I reached out to Dan Fox (who designed the system) and alerted him to the problem. He arranged a visit with Trane (the supplier) to troubleshoot the issue. It turns out that the software had somehow been corrupted. They reinstalled the software, tested the system, and everything is again functioning properly. Last Sunday, the sanctuary was again at a comfortable temperature. FYI, thanks to Dan's relationship with Trane from nonchurch-related business, the service call was at no charge.

African Girls Can

Since 2016, the Outreach Committee has been sponsoring two girls (Nancy and Rebecca) in a program called African Girls Can (AGC) founded by Phoebe Aringo. Many of you will remember Phoebe—she attended FPC for two years before returning home to her native Uganda.

African Girls Can sends poor rural Ugandan girls to St. Katherine's boarding school to receive a secondary level education rather than being married off as young teenagers. (The cost is only \$550 per year for each girl and includes tuition, board, uniforms, and school supplies).

Nancy and Rebecca have completed four years at St. Katherine's School in northern Uganda and are now enrolled in Good Samaritan School of Nursing and Midwifery in Lira. We are continuing to fund their education since it not only benefits the lives of the two girls, but will impact everyone in their respective villages when they return as trained nurses and midwives. (Presbyterian Women are currently sponsoring two younger girls, Salome and Sharon, at St. Katherine's school).

The citizens of Uganda were seriously impacted by the COVID pandemic and schools closed for almost two years while they awaited a vaccine. It would have been easy for the girls to lose hope or for their families to "marry them off"—but AGC found innovative ways to address their girls' and families' immediate needs:

• Emergency food and sanitation bundles were delivered regularly to all AGC families.

• Tablets, solar chargers, and internet plans were distributed to all 17 girls. The tablets also functioned as phones with WhatsApp and the girls formed online groups for support and communication.

• AGC paid for community radio programs to teach life skills to the city of Lira, and the girls even took turns speaking on the radio.

They helped fund access to online classes held by St. Katherine by upgrading the school's internet system.

AGC credits our church's continued funding with a significant role in these efforts. Amazingly, all 17 girls returned to school in January 2022! Funds donated by First Presbyterian helped not only Nancy and Rebecca, but benefitted all the girls in the program, their families, and the entire school community.

Come to Sunday School for 6-12 graders in April (with the exception of Easter) to help plan and rehearse for Youth Sunday on April 24.


Local Presbyterian Youth Event (instead of Triennium)
