CHARTING THE COURSE WITH PASTOR AARON

With December arriving, the year 2020 is coming to an end. I'm tempted to add to the end of that first sentence "and good riddance," but I won't. As much as this past year has had its share of upheaval and heartache, there have been moments of joy and hope along the way. For me, being called as your new pastor is certainly high on that list. For you, maybe it's less clear to see where the joy and hope has been. Whatever your experience has been this past year, I pray that our theme for Advent this year will be meaningful for you and bring you closer to Christ.

This year, our theme will be "Advent in Exile." During worship each Sunday, Pastor Jacobson and I will be preaching from the lectionary, which focuses on the experiences of God's people while in exile in Babylon. To the people in exile, the prophet Isaiah offered words of hope and promise. You might recognize these familiar words from Isaiah 61:1: "The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners." In the New Testament, Jesus said that those words from Isaiah were fulfilled in him (Luke 4:16-21). As Christians, we believe all the hopes and desires of God's people that we read about in the Hebrew scriptures are ultimately fulfilled in Jesus. Their hope was delivered to them in exile with the promise of Jesus. Yet, even when Jesus finally arrived generations later, the people were still in desperate circumstances. Many of them were living in their own land again but under Roman military occupation. Nevertheless, God's promise had come to them.

Brothers and sisters, this Advent will feel a bit like exile for us. It will be different, disappointing, and disorienting. Even still, the hope and promise of Christmas stands, because the hope and promise of Christmas will never die. Thank God for phones and tablets that can connect us to our families. Thank God for hospital and care center staff who can read our notes and letters to our loved ones. Thank God for live-streamed services that help us to remain connected to each other as we worship. Admittedly, none of those things are what we expected or really want. But isn't that part of the Christmas story? Into an impoverished family living at a precarious time in history, a fragile baby was born. That is the beginning of the story of how Jesus overcame the world. There is hope for you because of Jesus. Our story doesn't end with COVID. This is only a few stanzas in a much larger epic poem. Open up and read Matthew 1-2 and Luke 2 this Advent and hold onto the everlasting hope of Christmas.

What is a Blue Christmas Service?

As you see in the Advent and Christmas service schedule, we are having a Blue Christmas Service on December 21 at 7:00pm. The service will be live-streamed and available on our website and YouTube channel.

Sometimes called "The Longest Night" Service, Blue Christmas services typically take place on the winter solstice. We often think of the winter solstice as the shortest day of the year, but it is also the night with the longest period of darkness. You can choose to attend or participate in a Blue Christmas service for many reasons. Some people come because they are experiencing grief, illness, fractured relationships, depression, anxiety, or any number of other things that make being joyful during the Christmas season difficult. Others may come to support or pray for loved ones who are experiencing a time of difficulty.

It may sound like this service would not fit in with the time of hope and celebration we experience at Advent and Christmas, but the purpose of the service is to remind us of the joy that we ALL share in the Incarnation. Rev. Christa Brewer at First Presbyterian Church in Myrtle Beach has held Blue Christmas services for the last several years, and she notes that, "The Incarnation is a reason for celebration that God loved us so much that God sent Jesus to be with us, but it is also a reason for celebration that Jesus came to walk with us through the pains of life as well. I wish we could better hold these two messages together."

Stewardship Update

In the first week of the 2021 Stewardship campaign we received 133 Participation Cards totaling \$373,000. These totals are essentially the same as our campaign this time last year, and very gratifying given the restrictions on in-person worship. Our online presence has proven beneficial as about 25% of weekly contributions and nearly 30% of pledge cards were submitted through our website.

In last year's campaign we received a total of 196 pledges amounting to \$496,000 so if you haven't made your intended pledge for 2021, we hope you will do so at your earliest convenience. Under new Pastoral leadership and the continued dedication of so many,

there is clearly a sense of renewed hope and excitement for our church, despite the pandemic. It is an exciting time to be a member of First Pres. Pittsford!!

Year End Giving

We are most grateful for membership support of our operating budget. Please consider making your planned contributions in the coming weeks. Aside from your faithful support of the church, there are some important income tax considerations:

- Even if you take the Standard Deduction on your Federal return you can <u>still</u> deduct up to \$300 of CASH CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS from your income.
- Avoid capital gains tax by contributing appreciated stock from a non-retirement investment account. (Please contact Maria in the church office on the process and to ensure she identifies your contribution...brokers are not always clear).
- REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION is optional this year. If you do take a distribution and direct it to the church, that amount is excluded from your taxable income.

As always, consult your tax advisor on tax savings strategies.



Vital Congregations Mark 7: Ecclesial Health — Luis Martinez

We pray to our loving God to teach us the joy that is living our faith in a community of believers. We pray for His help in learning the gift of gratitude - for our boundless blessings. We pray that we see the virtue of extending grace - the very same grace we all enjoy - to others by extending ourselves, using outreach and explaining our church's mission in the course of our daily lives.

The Seventh Mark is referred to as Ecclesial Health. What do we mean by Ecclesial Health? Ecclesial Health can be defined as the extent to which a congregation exudes good decision-making, centers on an appropriate mission and vision, and prayerfully discerns its future. One way to assess the status of our Ecclesial Health is simply by recognizing those things we are already doing in the name of Christ. Among them are outreach activities that are healthy and life-giving – not only for ourselves as a congregation, but for others, others who might be near but may be overlooked or misunderstood, or not recognized in our daily routines. There are many activities we do as individuals and as a congregation to advance and extend our grace and mission. We have a long list – these are just the top 12:

These volunteer activities that we conduct at First Presby - and that's only half of them - are personally funded by members of our congregation. These donations help to emphasize the relational character of piety and devotion. Our activities and investment of our time, talent, and treasure lend witness to our Christian traditions. Through our mission and outreach they can be used to continue to establish and maintain our own Ecclesial Health.

What about our future? How do we witness to our next generation? How do we discern what to keep, and what to discard from among our many traditions?

Maybe we can begin with the end in mind – what does successful Ecclesial Health look like? How should we align our practices, how do we reconcile our traditions - to reach and sustain Ecclesial Health?

What traditions of our congregation contribute to the ministry of Christ?

Those are questions we can raise. Those are discussions we can have. And those are prayers we can lift up to God as we share our joys and concerns for ourselves as a faith community, and for those in the larger community. Those are supplications for guidance from our Lord and Shepherd as we create a healthy Ecclesial legacy for the next generation.

Advent Wreath Liturgy
