#### CHARTING THE COURSE WITH PASTOR AARON

My family is slowly settling into our new home in Fairport. We love being so close to the Trolley Trail and the Erie Canal along which we've already taken many bike rides. Everything is finding its place in our house, which is feeling more and more like our own place. I believe it's true in general, but particularly when unpacking a new house, that raising three small children requires a lot of team work. Laura and I try to help each other to save ourselves time and effort, and our communication is important. In particular, listening is important. However, I don't always listen as carefully as I should. Recently, I was going into our basement for a project I was working on, and, since I was already going down there, Laura asked if I could also bring up something she needed from the pantry. I agreed, but was so focused on my own thoughts that, within the 10 seconds it took me to get to the pantry, I had already forgotten what she asked me to do. Can you relate?

The chances are good that you can relate. Research shows that, despite spending much time every day listening, most people are actually very poor listeners! We are often too distracted or too uninterested to listen well. Proverbs 18:2 says, "A fool takes no pleasure in understanding, but only in expressing personal opinion." Later in that same chapter, another proverb says, "If one gives answer before hearing, it is folly and shame" (18:13). It seems these proverbs are holding a mirror up to the human experience and showing that many of us are often talking at one another, not talking with one another.

As your new Pastor, I come to you with experiences, ideas, hopes, and desires. I bring all of that with me in order to help lead you so that, together, we can discover a future yet unknown. However, I want to follow the wisdom of Proverbs so that I'm not just "expressing personal opinion" without first trying to find "understanding," which is why I am committing to a year of listening. Listening allows for true learning to take place. It allows for people to truly connect to each other. I want to spend my first year with you trying to listen deeply. I want to listen to understand who you are: your history, your traditions, and your values. I've enjoyed the opportunities to get to know many of you over Zoom, phone calls, emails, and the occasional in-person meeting. I want to create more opportunities for us to get to know each other, even while we are still physically distancing. So, I'm asking if you would sign up to meet with me on a Zoom call, so that I can get to know you and learn about what you love and value about our church. Please help me get to know our church, and let's listen intently to each other as we embrace what God has in store for our future.

We hope many of you had the opportunity to pray with your Pastors when we led the Prayer of Lament and Reconciliation that was posted to YouTube earlier in June. Along with Carol Anne Strawbridge and Rod Frohman, Aaron will be leading an 8-week conversation for our congregation on the topic of racism. We invite you to join the conversation. Everything we will be reading, listening to, and watching will be accessible to teenagers; so this invitation is open to youth and adults alike. We will be meeting Sundays from 7:00-8:00pm over Zoom, beginning on Sunday, July 19, and ending on Sunday, September 6. Prior to each meeting, we will have an assignment to read, listen to, or watch. At the meeting, we will open with a reflection from Scripture, followed by an open dialogue of our reactions to that week's assignment. ## **Vital Congregations Initiative**

### Vital Congregations Mark 2: Intentional Authentic Evangelism—Barbara Smith

The second mark of Vital Congregations is Authentic Evangelism or we can call it "sharing our faith in Jesus Christ in our relationships with others in our lives." The Bible tells of Jesus meeting a Samaritan woman at a well. Jesus first comes close to her, he draws her into conversation, and consequently, into relationship. The relationship comes first, then Jesus talks with her, offering her a "drink of water that will satisfy her thirst forever."

At a weekly virtual meeting of the National PCUSA Vital Congregations pastors cohort, Ray Jones spoke about this mark of vital congregations, saying that over the decades evangelism has evolved from being in your face, preachy and demanding, to "contextual." That is, actions show we are one with Christ and we add words that reflect that, within the context of the situation. For example, in his one trip to the store in weeks, Ray realized communication and interaction are not really what people want to do at the store right now. But he found himself trying to connect visually with a friendly smile. If we do someone a favor or unexpected service, we do it without necessarily stating we are doing this as a disciple of Christ. However, when the situation lends toward talking about our faith, acknowledging our source of strength, or offering a prayer—authentic evangelism happens! So this mark calls us to reach out to others, even at a time like this. Be open to greeting others (safely). Listen to those who may be stressed or anxious in this time of uncertainty. Pray. Send a note to say thank you to front line persons that you may know. And let's look forward to a time when we can meet directly with others again—and share our faith in Jesus Christ in both our actions—and sometimes our words.
