MUSINGS FROM REV. JIM

Eastertide concludes on May 31 with the celebration of God's gift of the Holy Spirit. We call it Pentecost Sunday because it was on the Jewish festival of Pentecost that the event happened. The story is found in Acts 2 and is a dramatic telling of this mystical and spiritual outpouring of God's spirit upon the apostles with "tongues of fire" on their heads, and a mighty wind blowing in the room without the windows open. This is the conception of the church, the empowering of the apostles for witness. The event kicks off the stories in Acts of the Apostles of all the ups and downs as apostles follow the Lord's instruction and give witness to the Lordship of Jesus from Judea, Samaria and to the ends of the earth.

But before Pentecost can happen, something else needs to happen. It's this peculiar biblical need to fill up the ranks of the apostles back to 12 after the loss of Judas Iscariot. There was unfinished business that needed taking care of. The sad story of Judas is remembered by Peter, the lead apostle, who finds a text from the Psalms that "another take his position of overseer" (Acts 1:20b). The gang needed to be 12. They can't move ahead until there is 12. The loss of Judas must be addressed, and another added to take his place. This reminds us that some things need attention before you can move on. First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford has concluded this task, and is ready now for the Day of Pentecost.

The apostles needed 12 in their ranks for the witness to be complete. The witness to Jesus was weakened with only 11, the last apostle was needed. There is good application here that we examine the ranks of our witness to be sure we are ready for the outpouring of God's spirit. I am not sure how we do this. Perhaps at least this can be a focus of prayer, as the church moves ahead now into new territory. We can pray, "Lord, fill the ranks, make complete and ready our witness for the coming Day of Pentecost."

There were two candidates for Judas' place among the apostles and they decide who it will be by "casting lots," basically flipping a coin, or letting the Lord decide who it will be. I like this method of choosing. It eliminates contention and offers a decision without winners and losers.

There are more staffing questions that remain for FPC Pittsford, but for now you are ready for the Day of Pentecost. Welcome to Pastor Aaron Neff, FPC Pittsford's new pastor and Head of Staff on Sunday, May 31, the Day of Pentecost.

Good News Jail and Prison Ministry

Like it or not, COVID-19 has made a permanent impression on all of us to a new meaning of the term "shelter in place." For most, making it a sane process means taking advantage of having family members with us, phones, face time, zoom video communications, cable TV, Netflix and some opportunity to stretch our legs, breath fresh air, and include visits to the store for the food for our tables.

For inmates, shelter in place means none of the above and most of the day spent in an $8' \times 10'$ prison cell. It is a routine process for up to a year for those in the county jails.

First Presbyterian Church has long supported the Good News Jail and Prison Ministry program which ministers to the spiritual needs of the local county jail system. A portion of our support is funding allocated from Outreach's annual budget. That funding supports the locally based Chaplains. Like all the agencies we support, our annual pledging commitments are important to this program.

There are other ways that you can personally support the efforts of the Chaplains as they work to improve the lives of the inmates for their time after incarceration. Inspirational reading materials that you may have at home, collecting dust, could be of great value to the program. The materials may include Bibles, prayer books, magazines (like the *Upper Room*), periodicals, or books with inspiring stories that turned people's lives around. Stories that provide hope to a flock that has gone astray. —AN IM-PORTANT NOTE: All books going to the prison must be soft bound.

As spring cleaning and rainy day opportunities free up your time, perhaps you could check your book shelves and basement boxes to see what you might have to offer the program? Once the church reopens, your discoveries can be dropped at the church in the drop off coat room behind the elevator in the main lobby (look for the bin). If you are excited to turn in materials right away, drop them off any time at Jim Weick's home 5 blocks from the church at 11 E. Jefferson Cir. We will get your donated gifts to the prison.

If you have any questions, please contact Jim at 727-4731. There are other opportunities to change lives at the jails. We can connect volunteer opportunities with your talents to improve lives at many levels. In His name we all serve.

Paul tells us in Acts 2 that the early Christians devoted themselves to the learning's of the Apostles. To wake up and come alive in our faith we too need to become lifelong learners. In 2016 parents were asked what they thought the Mission of Christian Education Committee should be. Here are some of the responses. As you read, what jumps out to you? Has our mission changed? Is it the same for adult Christian Education?
