CHARTING THE COURSE WITH PASTOR AARON

Happy May! It's important that the congregation stays continually informed about the progress we're making through our Faith Forward initiative. As you heard during the February 11 congregational debrief, the Faith Forward initiative identified four strategic objectives for our church:

- Everyday Faith to reimagine discipleship to become highly personal, relational, and biblical.
- **Groups and Gatherings** to provide safe places, times, and gatherings for people to connect on the journey.
- **Pittsford Connects** to reimagine our campus to become a safe place that meets our neighbors' "first" needs (physical, social, and emotional).
- **Re-align to our True North** to reduce the amount of organizational inefficiencies while refining structures to support what matters the most.

These objectives were announced at the debrief to inform you about the goals we're aiming to accomplish. No policies have been updated nor significant actions taken as of yet. Until the Session decides to make any updates or changes, it's business as usual. So... what have we actually done about these objectives since February 11? Well, the Session has decided to take on one objective at a time and is currently prioritizing the fourth objective to "Re-align to our True North." Toward that end, we are studying a decision-making and operational concept called "policy governance," which was developed by the psychologist and organizational theorist John Carver. The Deacons and the Trustees have been invited into this study. We are also talking to other churches who have refined their organizational structures so we can learn from their experiences.

I am also working with some of the Elders on a few ideas to develop our "Everyday Faith" objective. However, this is in the very nascent stages of development and has not been discussed by the Session as a whole nor by any Committees.

As I said, it is very important that you know that the momentum of the Faith Forward initiative moves ahead and that you are aware of what that forward motion entails. The Session is discussing ways that we can keep the channels of communication open with the congregation about this vital work. As always, we are hopeful about the future for First Presbyterian Church, knowing that we're following God's leading.

As written in James 2:14-18, 26:

What good is it my brothers and sisters, if someone claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save them? Suppose a brother or sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action is dead. But someone will say, "You have faith, I have deeds." Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by my deeds.... As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without deeds is dead.

By planning an estate gift for the church's endowment, you are acting to express your faith forward, and performing a deed as an expression of your faith.

The Legacy Committee will be sharing ideas of ways to leave a legacy and what your gift can do for our church. In the meantime, you can speak with our pastors and members of our Legacy Committee. What will your legacy be?

We will begin our next build in June at 207 Melville Street, which is just around the block from the Swan Market (a German deli) on Parcels Ave.










Concentus Women's Chorus presents "Songs Through the Senses"



On May 31 and June 1, Concentus Women's Chorus will be performing concerts of "Songs Through the Senses." The cornerstone piece is "Everyday Wonders: The Girl from Aleppo," with music by Cecilia McDowall. The lyrics are taken directly from *The Girl from Aleppo: Nujeen's Escape from War to Freedom*, by Nujeen Mustafa and Christina Lamb. Both works tell the moving and true story of two sisters fleeing Syria for the safety of Germany, and the obstacles they face along the way, especially as Nujeen, who has cerebral palsy, must travel by wheelchair. Concentus performed this work last summer in Kent, England, where they collaborated with Vox Anima Chamber Chorus. They were privileged to have the composer in the audience and knew they must bring this moving and important piece to audiences in Rochester.



This concert is being presented in honor of <u>Rochester Refugee Resettlement Services (RRRS)</u>, whose mission is to provide services and opportunities to ensure assimilation of refugees into our society by providing assistance as they strive to be self-sustaining neighbors while still maintaining their own cultural heritage.
