#### A WFF WORD FROM DR. WFFNINK

As I pen this last Wee Word from Dr. Weenink as your Interim Pastor, I can't help but think of the amount of words I have spoken or written in this capacity over the past two years. It has been such a richly rewarding, fulfilling, meaningful, and productive time for me. My prayer is that something positive has happened for you. If I were to choose one word to sum up my experience with you, the one that shoots to the surface is GRATITUDE. I am so grateful for this very short season in ministry. Yes, we had limits on what we could accomplish, but we made the best of the finite time and resources within our reach.

In our own frenetic lives, amidst the deluge of deadlines, debt, drama, and daily duties, at times we overlook the boundless dimensions of God's good gifts. It is easy for us to put blinders on our hearts and overlook a healthy attitude of gratitude.

Gratitude is a worldview, a way of looking at and living life. Rabbi Harold Kushner is a remarkable soul and an insightful theologian. In commenting on the beautiful phrase from the Twenty-Third Psalm, "My cup runneth over," he says: "Gratitude is more than remembering to mumble 'thank you.' It's more than a ritual of politeness. Gratitude is a way of looking at the world that does not change the facts of your life but has the power to make your life more enjoyable."

The literary great C. S. Lewis, as he explored his newfound faith, observed the Bible's, particularly the Psalter's, insistence that we praise and thank God. He also observed the connection between gratitude and personal well-being. He noted that the healthiest people he knew were the grateful ones, the ones always thanking. Said C. S. Lewis, "I noticed how the humblest and at the same time most balanced minds praised most, while cranks, misfits, and malcontents praised the least. Praise almost seems to be inner health made audible."

Rabbi Kushner captured this so movingly when he reflected: "Each night as I prepare for bed I put drops in my eyes to fend off the threat of glaucoma that would rob me of my sight and take from me the pleasure of reading. Each morning at breakfast, I take a pill to control my blood pressure, and each evening at dinner I take another to control my cholesterol level. But instead of lamenting the ailments that come with growing older, instead of wishing I was as young and as fit as I once was, I take my medicine with a prayer of thanks that modern science has found ways to help me cope with those ailments. I think of all my ancestors who didn't live long enough to develop the complications of old age and did not have pills to take when they did."<sup>2</sup>

Beyond recognizing the gift and its source, gratitude finds completion through a faithful <u>response</u>. In other words, Gratitude, if it is genuine, needs to be translated into action. This is really an outline for the stewardship of life, which is God's most precious gift. An authentic anatomy of thanks is not rooted in image and appearance, but <u>heart</u>; not what <u>we have</u>, but **how** and **for what** <u>we use</u> what we have. I pray that you will bear that in mind in your 2020 VISION.

Gratitude unlocks the fullness of life. It turns what we have into enough, and more. It turns denial into acceptance, chaos to order, confusion to clarity. It can turn a meal into a feast, a house into a home, a stranger into a friend. Gratitude, and our expression of it, is not as complicated as we are inclined to

make it. It simply involves recognizing the gift, acknowledging its source, and making a response with both a maturity of spirit and material endeavor.

A poet wrote,

Thank God for dirty dishes;
They have a tale to tell.
While other folks go hungry,
We're eating pretty well.
With home, and health, and happiness,
We shouldn't want to fuss;
For by this stack of evidence,
God's been very good to us.

I pray that you can look deep into the recesses of your soul, not only to recognize, but radiate and reflect—an attitude of gratitude.

From the very depth of my being. From the bottom of my heart. Let me please simply say: Thank you!

#### **Thoughts on Generosity**

Like Bartimaeus (Mark 10:46), perhaps you're blind to the way our church budgets for the upcoming year. This article will open your eyes to the process we use to set our annual financial course.

We depend on giving to sustain our operations. As we mentioned in the October *Good News*, our expenses are now exceeding our income. How'd that happen? Expenses have remained relatively fixed year to year. However, our giving has declined \$100,000 or an average of 5% per year over the past three years. Much of this decline is due to member demographics through the loss of faithful members to death and relocation.

Our church strongly supports mission and worship. Much of the paid staff's time is tied to those two aspects of our Mission Statement: We are a caring community, growing spiritually as disciples of Jesus Christ. Together we spread the good news of Jesus through worship, fellowship, education, prayer, and especially mission.

As the 2019 narrative budget shows, we spend 30% of our budget on Mission, 25% on Worship, 22% on Education, and 23% on Fellowship. Worship outlays include worship leadership, music, and special services (weddings, funerals, youth service). These combine to provide a meaningful and spiritually uplifting experience.

Education includes Sunday school, LOGOS, Bible studies, adult enrichment, and small groups. We support opportunities for all ages and formal, as well as informal education. For Fellowship, we support youth activities,

pastoral visits, the fellowship hour (think donut holes & coffee), meeting and greeting our neighbors, member assistance, and prayer support. These activities all create a warm and welcoming environment.

Our Mission Statement puts an emphasis on Mission for a good reason. The Outreach Committee takes 10% of annual church contributions (Benevolence) and allocates it to local, regional, and international organizations. In 2019 this amounted to \$61,000. In addition to that, indirect mission contributions total over \$110,000. Indirect mission contributions are the amounts given for Special Offerings, Fund Raising (e.g., Habitat for Humanity, Presbyterian Women Penny Pincher proceeds), participant contributions for mission trips, disaster relief, and JASY trips, as well as annual distributions from Endowment Funds designated for Mission by donors. Our total Mission contribution of \$170,000 represents 20% of all funds received by the church.

For a relatively small active congregation, our donations of time, talent, and money have made wonderful impacts all over. Please consider your 2020 pledge carefully and know that your involvement has a worldwide impact.

#### **Year-End Giving**

We are grateful for the financial support from the congregation and know that many folks plan to make contributions at year end. Fulfilling your 2019 Stewardship commitment, if able, or making that planned contribution is particularly important this year. Here are a couple of **TAX TIPS** that may be of value in deciding how to make your contributions:

Donating appreciated stock from a **TAXA-BLE ACCOUNT** will avoid capital gains tax. Please contact Maria in the office (Tuesdays through Thursdays, 586-5688) on the process and to ensure she is aware of your intent (brokers may not provide adequate donor information). Stock donations should be made by **December 1**, to ensure timely receipt and posting to your 2019 member account.

For those over 70 ½, choosing to contribute a portion of your **REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBU-TION** from a **RETIREMENT/IRA ACCOUNT** excludes that charitable contribution from taxable income. Under your instruction, the account custodian simply sends a check directly to the church (not to you). Although you do not receive a charitable deduction on your tax return, this deduction may not be as beneficial with last year's tax law change.

Consult your tax advisor if you are considering tax advantaged charitable contributions, and refer any questions to Maria. Rest assured we are grateful for your contribution in all cases.

#### **Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) Update**

Currently, our Ministry Information Form (MIF) has been viewed 589 times. There are currently 627 positions posted in the Church Leadership Connection (CLC) out of Louisville--- 36 of the 627 are positions available for those seeking Head of Staff( who supervise one teaching elder and other staff) from our MIF. There are 954 PIF's seeking a Head of Staff position, of those 954 seekers in the CLC 222 Personal Information Forms (PIF's) prefer NY.

Since, the PNC had it's first meeting in early October of 2018, we developed the MIF, then we had to have our MIF approved by Session and the Committee on Ministry in December of 2018, then we had to enter our MIF information into the CLC system in Louisville, then we received our first batch of potential candidates in January of 2019. Since then the PNC has been meeting weekly and sometimes more frequently to review the 9 batches of PIF's which equates to approximately 175 PIF's, had numerous first phone interviews, Skype second interviews, listened to sermons and have called references of potential candidates.

The four potential candidates that we told you about in August that either they decided not to move forward with us or PNC did not feel they were the right fit for Head of Staff for Pittsford, Carrie's departure and the Session's adoption of the Vital Congregation Initiative, that was launched in early September, gave the PNC an opportunity to revisit existing PIF's under a new light and request additional PIF's to review from the CLC.

As we shared with the Congregation at both Services on October 6th that we will be having two potential candidates visit Pittsford later in October.

We ask that you please keep us in your prayers as we continue to go through this process of listening for what God and the Holy Spirit are guiding us to do for First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford.

#### Can Ya Kenya?

A mission group is heading to Kenya again this year and we want you to join us! There are plenty of jobs for all skills and abilities at the Rehema for Kids orphanage (formerly known as In Step):

- help with the babies and toddlers—how are your cuddling skills?
- teachers' aids to help in the classrooms and anyone who can teach a STEM class to the older kids
- we are donating the finances to build a covered picnic pavilion where the older children can eat helping or supervising the building by local workers is another opportunity
- two dentists are making a return trip and they need assistants to escort the children, hand them equipment etc. (on the job training will be provided!)
- we also have a pediatrician going and she would love to have an assistant with a nursing, medical technician or health background to help her.

The trip is from December 27 to January 11, which includes an optional safari at the end. The total cost is around \$1,800 for airfares etc. and some need-based scholarships are available. 
