#### THE VITAL CONGREGATION INITIATIVE

First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford is a vital congregation. There is a rich reservoir of resources, strengths, and qualities that distinguish FPCP as a vital congregation. There are a host of fortes in our midst of which we can be proud. First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford is a good model for ministry. We are also humbly aware of areas that call for our growth. God is good. Guidance for that growth has come to us.

In 2017, the Presbyterian Church USA launched a revitalization initiative called Vital Congregations. Two Presbyteries successfully piloted and refined that project. Genesee Valley Presbytery is among 14 presbyteries who have chosen to participate in the first wave of the 2020 Vital Congregations Initiative (VCI). Last May, two from our congregation (Cindy Becker and Heze Simmons) went to Atlanta to learn more about it. Last June, the Session voted to participate.

The purpose of the Vital Congregations Initiative is to work alongside leaders of existing congregations continually assessing, discerning, and living into faithful actions that increase vitality through intentional spiritual practices that take them deeper into following Jesus Christ, so that their own lives are changed, congregations are transformed, and the mission of God spread throughout particular communities and the world.

The Vital Congregation Initiative intentionally works to enhance what are known as the seven "marks" of vital congregations. These marks emerge out of what we know as the Great Ends of the Church. The marks are:

- Lifelong Discipleship
- Authentic Evangelism
- Outward Incarnational Focus
- Servant Leadership
- Spirit-Inspired Worship
- Caring Relationships
- Ecclesial Health

Through intentional spiritual practices (prayer, proclamation, and praise) and relational connections during this two-year process, we will seek to assess, identify, and live into transformative actions that increase vitality. We will benefit from learning the 'best practices' of other congregations. All is intended to deepen, broaden, widen, heighten our discipleship.

There are two facilitators from Genesee Valley Presbytery (Jim Renfrew and Susan Orr) who have been trained to guide our congregation through the process. On Sunday, September 8, Welcome-Back-Sunday, our worship experiences at 8:30 am and 10:00 am will roll-out, lift-up, and engage us in the journey to an even richer vitality. It is really important for all to make an effort to participate in worship that day and enjoy the spectacular picnic that follows.

Yes, FPCP is a vital congregation. We are a strong church. God is calling us to move from strength to strength. All athletes continue to condition. Artists and performers seek ways to improve. Scholars delve deeper into their subject matter.

This entire VCI effort hits the sweet spot for all we learned from the extensive Congregational Mission Study completed in 2018. It will provide focal points for our educational, worship, missional, and fellowship endeavors.

- A re-turn to God and re-forming of God's people is necessary.
- This is a crucial time of awakening throughout our neighborhoods, nation, and world.
- The Holy Spirit's power is changing, re-forming, and revitalizing the Church.
- It is necessary to rediscover faithful discipleship in a 21st-century context.
- God is calling the Church to transform and transcend cultures and contexts.
- We must move from inward institutions to neighborhood relationships and mission.

#### The core values are:

- Courage, conviction, and commitment to faithful discipleship
- Prayerful discernment
- Reliance upon Scripture
- Persistence—emboldened/enacted faith
- Honest assessment
- Resilience
- Intentional pursuits of reconciliation
- Hopefulness in change

#### The Vital Congregation Initiative is Not:

- A universal program instructing churches and assuring vitality and sustainable life
- · Another plan that promises an immediate fix
- An attempt for the PC(USA) to tell churches what to do
- An institutional survival guide for membership numbers and buildings
- An encouragement to tweak, yet remain the same
- A return to glory days gone by
- Another "hoop" we have to jump through to call our next Pastor-head of staff.

It is promising, purposeful, well-planned, with some proven results. Step-up and step-into the Vital Congregation Initiative. In a spirit of verve, vivacity, and vigor—I am yours in faith,

#### **Pastor Nominating Committee Update**

Currently, our Ministry Information Form (MIF) has been viewed by 478 people. There are currently 678 positions posted in the Church Leadership Connection (CLC) out of Louisville—129 of the 678 are positions available for those seeking their first call. There are 53 positions vacant in NY and of the 2,039 call seekers in the CLC, 228 Personal Information Forms (PIF's) prefer NY.

Since, the PNC had its first meeting in early October of 2018, we developed the MIF, then we had to have our MIF approved by Session and the Committee on Ministry in December of 2018, then we had to enter our MIF information into the CLC system in Louisville, then we received our first batch of potential candidates in January of this year. Since then the PNC has reviewed approximately 150 PIF's, had numerous phone and Skype interviews, listened to sermons and have called references of potential candidates.

The four potential candidates that we told you about last month, who visited Pittsford and preached in a vacant pulpit in our Presbytery, have either decided that they are no longer being called to Pittsford or the PNC felt they were not the correct candidate for Pittsford.

The PNC is currently in the process of reviewing more PIF's, as well as revisiting past potential candidates and performing more phone and Skype interviews. We are viewing these candidates in a different light due to the recent changes occurring as a result of Carrie's departure and the Session adopting the Vital Congregation Initiative that will be launched this Fall.

We ask that you please keep us in your prayers as we continue to go through this process of listening for what God and the Holy Spirit are guiding us to do for First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford.

#### **Presbyterian Women**

This fall PW will have the Penny Pincher sale, which is our largest fundraiser. The monies from this sale of donated household items allow us to support many charitable organizations. One of them is African Girls Can in northern rural Uganda. We support these two young girls, Sharon Akao and Salome Adong, who aspire to be a doctor and an engineer. One year of education including uniforms, books, room and board, plus many extra-curricular activities only costs \$500 per girl. This schooling can break the cycle of poverty and a life without options. Presbyterian Women of FPC has committed to pay for the high school education of these two girls until they graduate.

There are no income requirements and no appointment is needed, just bring ID and one piece of mail less than 30 days old. We are a client choice food pantry with fresh fruits & vegetables, bread and frozen meat, in addition to non-perishable items. Clients may participate every other week. Hours are Tuesday and Friday 9:30am to 1:30pm and the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday of each month 9:30-11:30am. Call 264-9860 for information. 
#### **Optimists Questionnaire**

#### The Gospel of Matthew in Context by Rev. Rod Frohman

"Matthew" a learned theologian, historian, and church leader, realizes that faith in Christ as the present, strong Son of God is just one generation away from extinction. His multicultural, Greek-speaking, Jewish/Gentile, upper-middle-class congregation in the city of Antioch of Syria is: a.) ignorant of who Jesus was, b.) doubts the real presence of Christ in their lives some 50 years after Jesus' crucifixion/resurrection, and c.) is under some persecution from the Jewish religious establishment in the city of Antioch, a group of people with whom they are in the process of reluctantly parting.



So Matthew gathers oral and written Jesus stories, tosses in a few of his own, and writes a Jesus story to say, "It was tough back then too. God seemed both present and absent then. Now, in 90 A.D., (the approximate time of the writing of the gospel) Christ will always be with us when we turn around, change, and imitate his example among all types of people while simultaneously living a simple, unpretentious, and fruitful life."
